Activities

The two components to this class are attendance and presentation/service: Attendance:

You are required to attend at least eight performances or clinics/master-classes presented by the UNO Department of Music or off-campus musical events that are UNO related. These include (but are not limited to) Recital Hour, Jazz at the Sandbar, Musical Excursions, Degree Recitals, and clinics/master-classes. In order to receive credit for attendance, you will need either to stay for the entire performance (if less than one hour), or for at least one hour (if longer).

Service: You are required to perform one act of service such as a public performance, an educational presentation on or off-campus, volunteering your time as teacher or as an accompanist.

Final Document

You will be required to submit a final document listing the eight events that you attended and the one act of service that you performed before the last day of class of the given semester.
